

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Immersion Hui plan

- Rebrand to make it clear around what these courses are –possibly 'Extended Learning Opportunity Programmes'
- Focused on teaching and learning;
- we are taking each student out of their school for a week
- we need to be providing educationally rich learning which is MORE than they would be receiving in their home school
- Development of identity Deaf Culture Exposure from young.
- Immersion into Deaf culture as one aspect of this for extended learning
- Local focus hui e.g., Ngāti Porou 12 students all whakapapa back to them making connection with the local marae and experts - go to them for 3 nights – tapping into their expertise to provide meaningful and authentic learning.
- Just as we want to see Māori succeeding as Māori, we want to see Deaf succeeding as Deaf.



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
